As the war between Israel and Iran rages onward one may hear or view much distorted information from uneducated individuals that have no clue about the Middle East. As Jewish people we should have Judaic factual historical information to address anyone who can not comprehend news coming from the State of Israel or other correspondents. The war from October 7, 2023 was a new beginning and an awakening to the Jewish people. Three millennia of Jewish history would be a semester of university learning. I will endeavour to present this shortened version in a nutshell.

When reading most of the historical literature it will not be compared to religious literature, however it will have archaeological sources, writings from accredited individuals and sources throughout the three millennia about the Jewish people. Some historical literature will have editions mentioning Israel as Palestine during ancient times, which is improper and needs to be corrected. The Israelites conquered Canaan under Joshua's leadership in 1250 B.C.E., which then became known as Judea.

The word Palestine comes from the first known Greek historian and geographer, Herodotus in the fifth century B.C.E., not to be confused with Philistia (Philistines of Goliath). One learns that King David conquers a city on a hill and renames it "Yerusalem" (City of Peace) in 1010-900 B.C.E. The kingdom was united and then divided into two regions. However, in 928-721/732 B.C.E. the Northern Kingdom Israelites are exiled for the first time. The fall of Israel is in 721 and the Southern Kingdom in 928-586 B.C.E., the fall of Judah, the destruction of the First Temple of Jerusalem and the Babylonian Exile.

The edict of Cyrus, allowing the first group of exiles to return to Jerusalem and rebuild the Holy Temple (586 B.C.E). The completion of the Second Temple was in 516. The Maccabean era was 165-138 B.C.E. Hanukkah may be found in the Apocrypha. While the Common Era starts around Jesus of Nazareth (who was a Jewish Zealot fighting for religious freedom and died a Jew) around 27-30 C.E., the word Christian does not appear until 100 years later. Islam appears with Muhammod in 632. He died in 634 and the Uymadi Caliph wrote Antisemitic text into the Koran. Notice that the real indigenous people for the three millennia are the Jewish people.

The fighting continues over whose land is it. The book I suggest people read is, "When the Stones Speak" by Doron Spielman (no spoiling the amazing history of our people). While the wall around Jerusalem is not the whole city of Jerusalem, the graves of King David and King Solomon are found outside the wall. The oldest area was just uncovered during Queen Victoria's reign, and Baron Rothschild purchased the land. Other lands up in the northern region of Israel were sold to the Jewish people after the 1929 stock market crash, which now gives Israel the rights to fresh water. The Jewish people purchased the land from Tel Aviv (Hill Spring) to Jerusalem!

Let us continue to support Israel in any way we are able.

Let us continue to pray for the return of the hostages in Gaza and for peace to come to Israel once again. May we one day soon travel to Israel together!

ROSH CHODESH

In recent years New Moon observance has been rekindled by women's groups to foster community and personal spiritual growth. Every Hebrew month is thought to have unique meaning and significance, and Rosh Chodesh groups seek to honor the themes of the month, set intentions, and review important holidays and events on the Jewish calendar for that month.

Beit Chaverim offers Rosh Chodesh gatherings most months, open to both men and women, to learn about the upcoming month and enjoy group sharing and discussions. Rosh Chodesh, which literally translates as "head of the month", is the observance of the beginning of a new month on the Jewish calendar. In ancient times, the Sanhedrin established every new month by way of heralds who would report the first sighting of the waxing crescent moon. Special sacrifices were made in accordance with Torah (Numbers 10:10 and 28:11-15), and trumpets were blown to mark the occasion.

The Hebrew month follows the lunar cycle, which is 29.5 days, therefore months alternate between 29 and 30 days. Rosh Chodesh is a two day observance when a month has 30 days. This is the case in the book of 1 Samuel 20:5-42, which describes a 2 day feast to observe Rosh Chodesh during which King Saul's son, Jonathan, saves David from Saul's wrath. It is also always observed for two days in the diaspora.

According to tradition, Rosh Chodesh was a Yom Tov given to women because of their steadfast faith during the Exodus from Egypt, demonstrated by their refusal to donate jewelry for creating the golden calf. Another connection to the holiday's feminine aspect is that women's monthly cycles have long been associated with the phases of the moon. The Zohar, the kabbalistic book of Jewish mystical tradition, connects the moon to the Shekhinah, the feminine aspect of Divine Presence.
